While attending Wasatch High School, he was captivated by a beautiful girl in a yellow sweater, Shirley Wright, and spent the rest of his life loving and caring for her. Ralph and Shirley were married on October 30, 1947 and spent almost 70 years together; a wonderful example of partnership, cooperation, and commitment. Ralph attended Brigham Young University on a scholarship and was then admitted to the dental school at Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri. He graduated in 1954 with a D.D.S. degree and later that year joined the Air Force, serving in Harlingen, Texas until 1956 when he moved his young family back to Utah. He opened his private practice in Murray where he continued to provide exceptional service to his patients for many years. He served as the president of the Utah Dental Association, was chairman of the Utah State Board of Dental Examiners, chairman of the Council of Examinations for the American Association of Dental Examiners, and a charter member of the Western Regional Examining Board. He received the Utah Dental Association's Distinguished Service Award in 1989. He also lectured to dental groups in China, India, South America, Russia, Denmark, Austria, Switzerland, and the Philippines.

His choice of Murray was fortuitous as it gave him the opportunity to become involved in a growing

community and meet many wonderful friends and colleagues. He served as president of the Murray Chamber of Commerce and received its Civic Service Award. Ralph was a charter member of the Murray Rotary Club where he maintained 100% attendance until his declining health made that impossible. He served as the president of the Murray Club in 1959-1960; was the District Governor for Rotary International District 542 in 1988-1989; and led a Rotary Study Exchange Group to Israel in 1978. He was a Paul Harris Fellow and in 1987 was awarded Rotary International's Citation for Meritorious Service. The friendships developed from his membership in Murray Rotary were life-long and highly treasured. He was able to combine his love of dentistry and his commitment to the ideals of Rotary to contribute much good to his community, the state, and many parts of the world. In 1985, he traveled to the island of Palawan, part of the Philippines, to serve as a volunteer dentist for 30 days in a refugee camp established by the United Nations for the boat people from Vietnam. He went back in 1986 and 1987 for additional 30 day tours. He spent Monday through Friday treating Vietnamese refugees and the weekends providing dental care to the people of Palawan. The dental needs of the Philippine people motivated him to plan, build and deliver a mobile dental clinic to Palawan. With a generous grant from Rotary International and Direct Relief International, Ralph designed the mobile clinic and had it built on a 38 foot Winnebago chassis in Phoenix, Arizona. He then obtained the services of the US Air Force to fly the clinic to the Philippines. He made 10 additional trips to Palawan to train the local dentists and provide dental services to the local people. For many years the mobile clinic visited remote areas of Palawan providing care to over 100,000 patients.

While testing the prototype of the Palawan clinic, Ralph provided dental services to several of the homeless people at St. Vincent de Paul Center and discovered the tremendous need that existed in his own city. In 1990, he organized and began operating Salt Lake Donated Dental Services, a non-profit clinic, to provide free dental care to the homeless and indigent of the Salt Lake valley. Ralph recruited volunteer dentists, hygienists, dental supply companies and dental labs and solicited funds from generous individuals and foundations. This clinic has grown from a single room at St. Vincent de Paul, through several iterations, to its current location at the Sorenson Unity Center with state of the art equipment and services. To date, Salt Lake Donated Dental Services has provided over \$18 million in dental services to some of our community's most vulnerable residents.

In addition to the travels related to dentistry, Ralph and Shirley were able to take fabulous trips ranging from the Galapagos to Timbuktu (literally), and numerous locations in between. They were able to visit 57 countries, most of the trips planned in meticulous detail by Ralph and made in the company of close friends.

Ralph contributed many hours to his church, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. He especially enjoyed teaching, any age and any subject. And he always found time for his family.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Joan Banks Thompson; parents Guy and Noveta Thompson; and sister Nancy Jones.

He is survived by his sons, Paul, David and Gregory; daughters-in-law Diane Thompson and Birgit Wassmuth; grandchildren Eudora, Walker, Joshua and Megan; and great-grandchildren Cali Jo, Elizabeth, Camille, Maddison and Everett.

Richard attended Greenwood High School (Class of 1951) in Springfield and, at age 18, served as the national president of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship. He attended Vanderbilt University (Class of 1955) in Nashville, Tenn., and earned his M.D. at Washington University (cum laude, Class of 1959) in St. Louis.

Dr. Thompson practiced pediatrics in Denver, Colorado. A Vietnam era veteran, Richard served as a captain in the U.S. Army at Martin Army Hospital on Fort Benning, Georgia. After discharge from the military, Richard became chief of pediatric medicine at the hospital in Columbus, Georgia, where he developed a sub-specialty and created an innovative unit in neonatal intensive care. He also served as a member of the clinical faculty at Emory University's School of Medicine in Atlanta.

In the mid-1970's, Richard began a second career, writing accreditation standards for the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, now the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, in Chicago. After serving as a vice president at the Illinois Hospital Association in Oakbrook, Illinois, Richard was named president of Thompson, Mohr and Associates, specialized consultants who updated hospital bylaws to reflect current JCAHO accreditation standards and who worked with hospitals nationwide to prepare for re-accreditation visits.

Richard never really retired. He taught medical ethics online at Drury University. A well-known and prolific writer, Richard authored "Healthcare Reform as Social Change" (1993), Medical Staff Leader's Practical Guidebook" (2003), "Think Before You Believe: Modern Day Myths, Questionable Claims, and Uncommon Sense" (2005), and "So You're On the Ethics Committee? A Primer and Practical Guidebook: 21st Century Practical Ethics Applied to 21st Century Health Care" (2007). In Southwest Missouri, Richard published his slice-of-life columns in the Bolivar Herald-Free Press and Springfield News-Leader. Richard enjoyed singing tenor in church choirs; following college football and basketball; attending theatre plays, especially when son Greg is on stage; posing ethics challenges to son Paul who holds the W.K. Kellogg Chair in Agricultural Food, and Community Ethics at Michigan State University; and trying

to understand why son David would pursue a hobby in stock car racing. He was particularly proud of serving the City of Springfield (2010-2015) as founding chair and member of the Citizens Sales Tax Oversight Committee. Richard's work with this task force was recognized and acknowledged, by resolution, in City Council Bill 2015-123.
